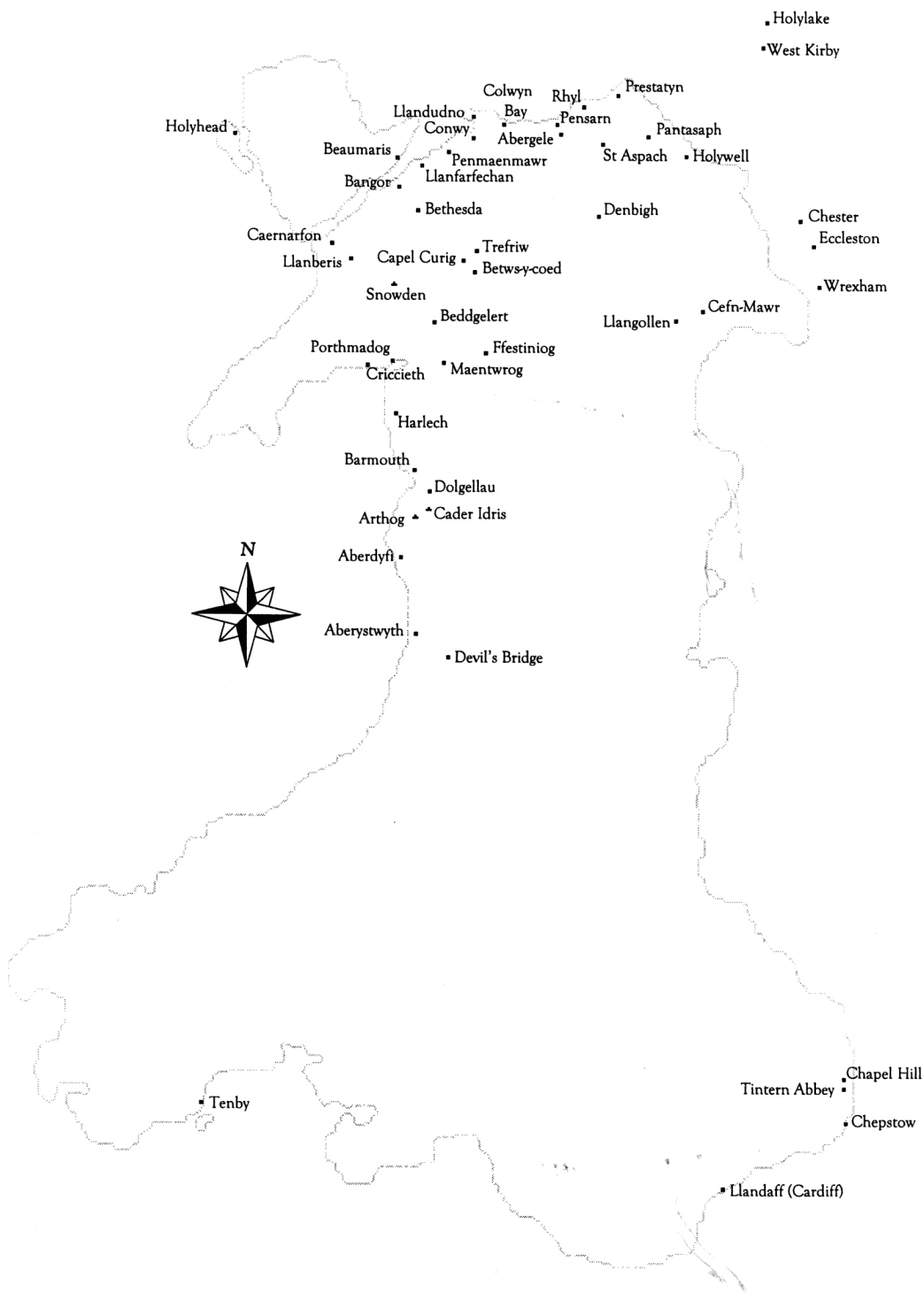


Map of Wales showing locations of photographs by Francis Bedford

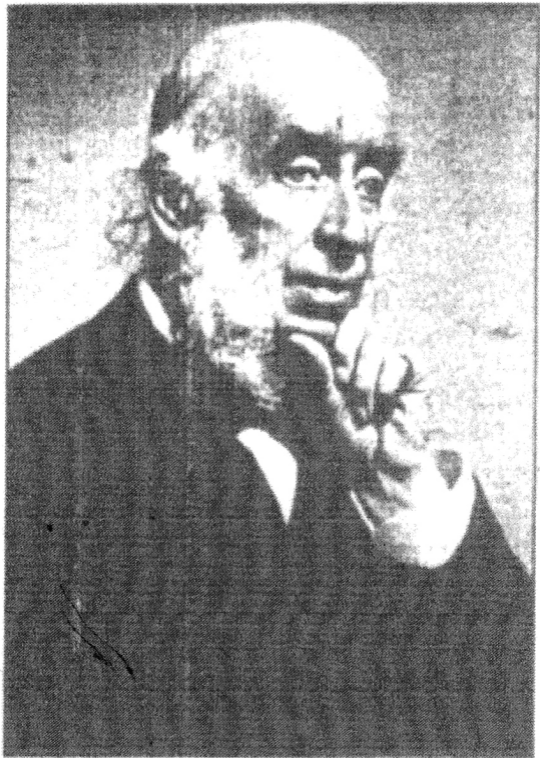


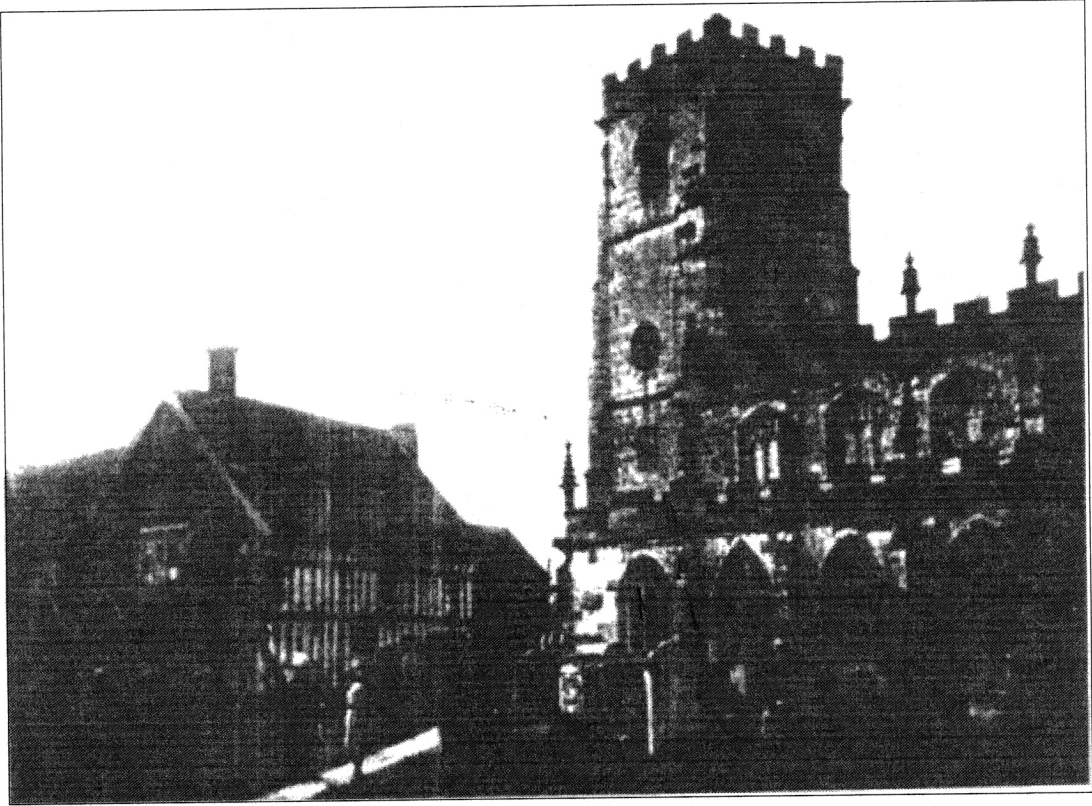

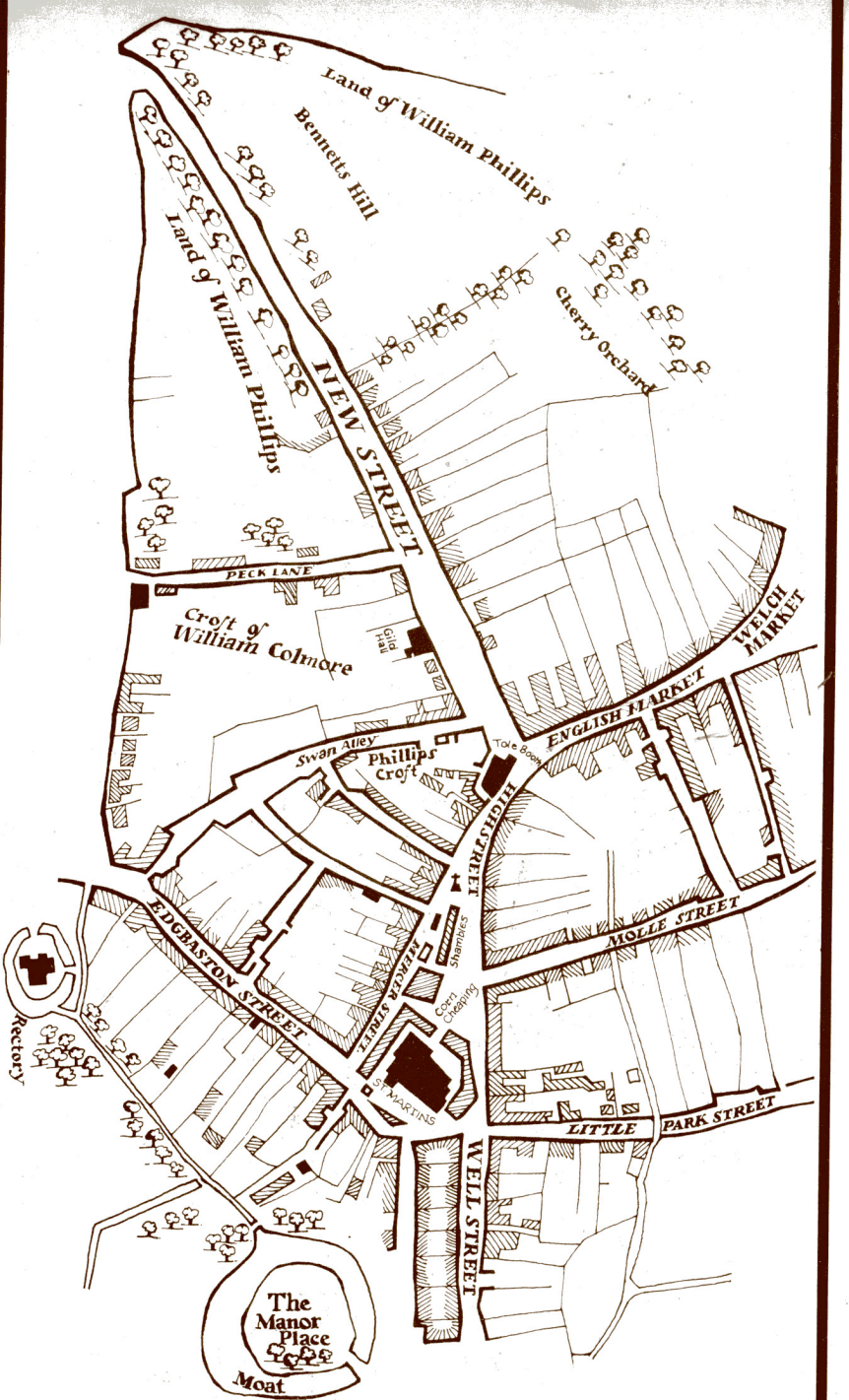

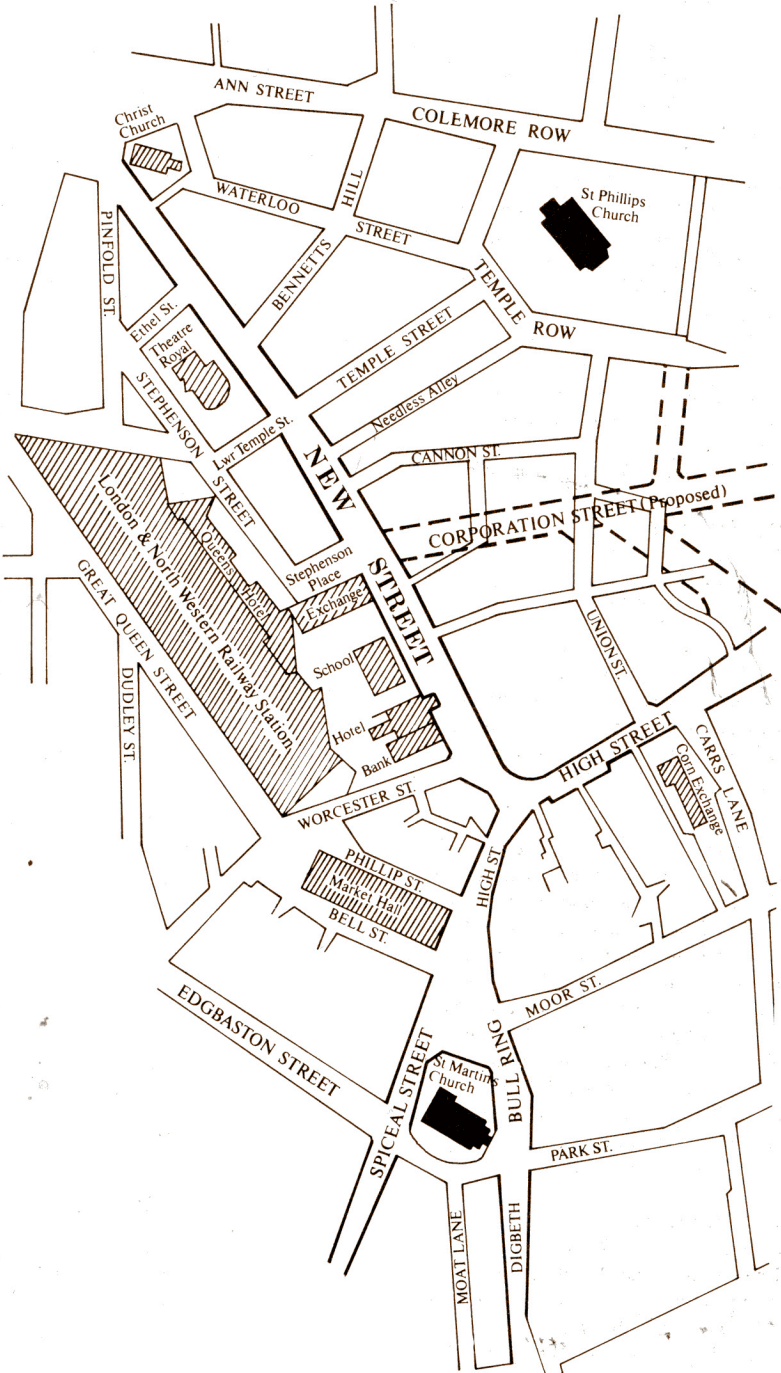

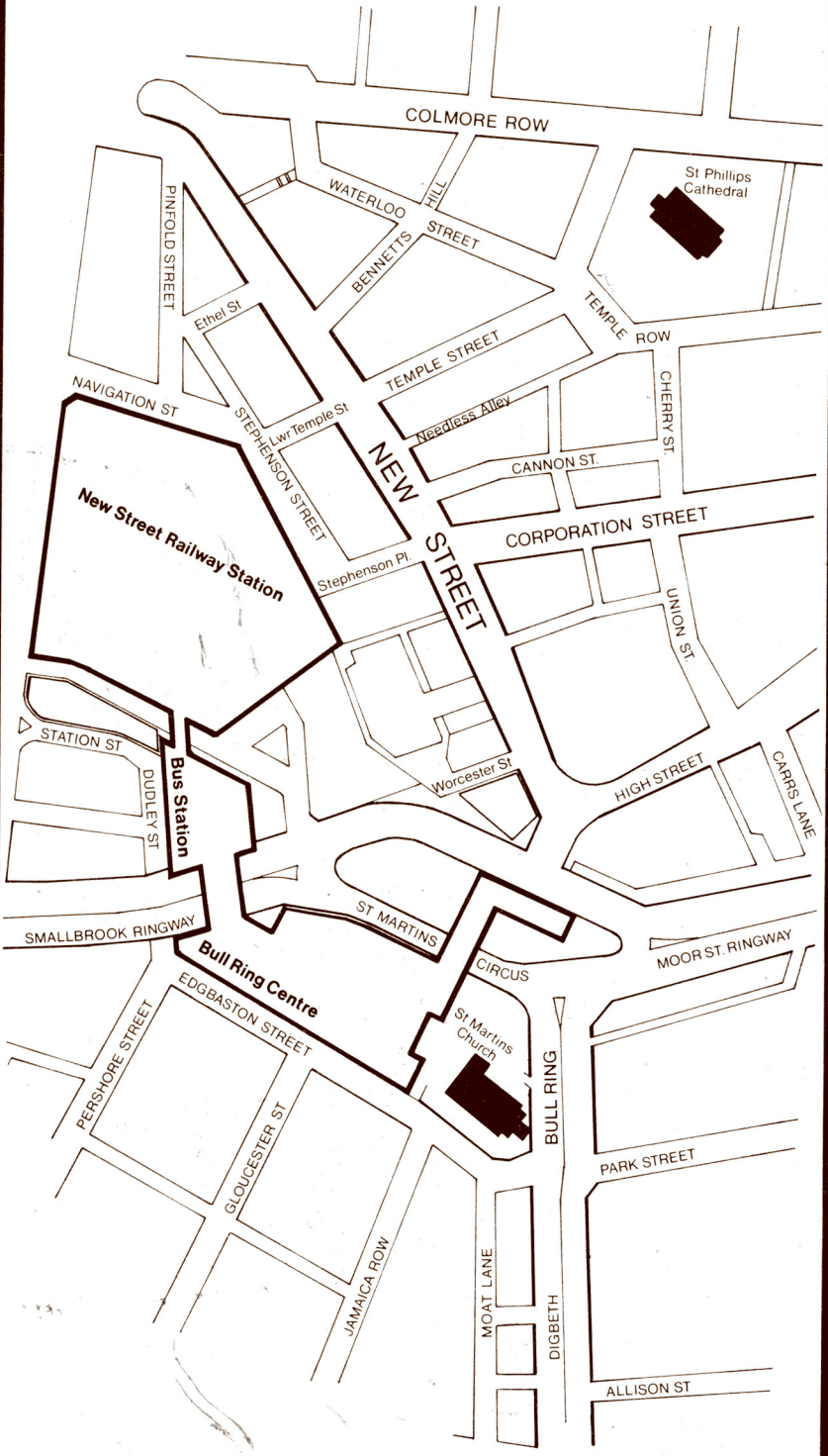

The Borough of Birmingham street map of 1884, showing its limited boundaries.



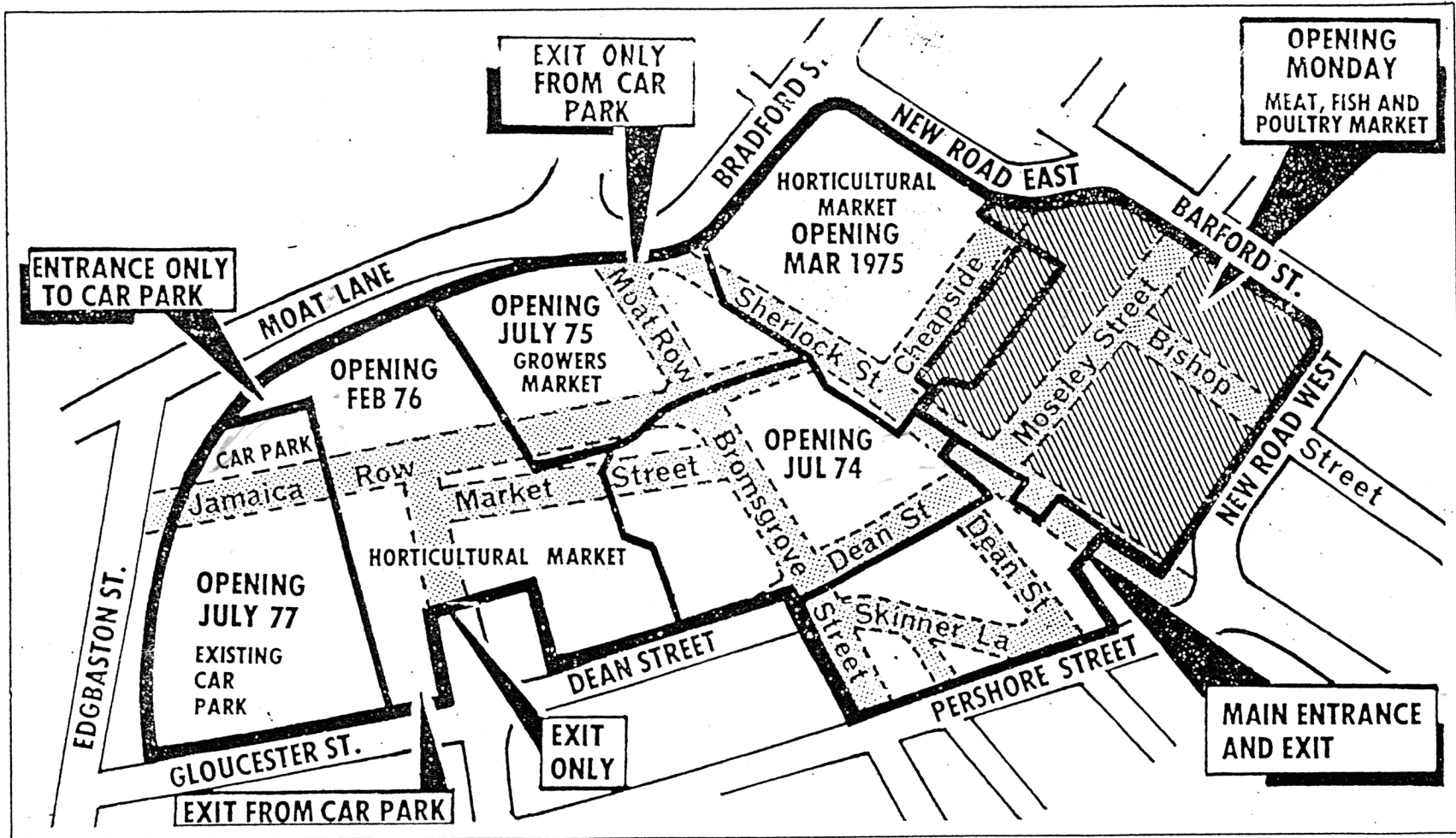


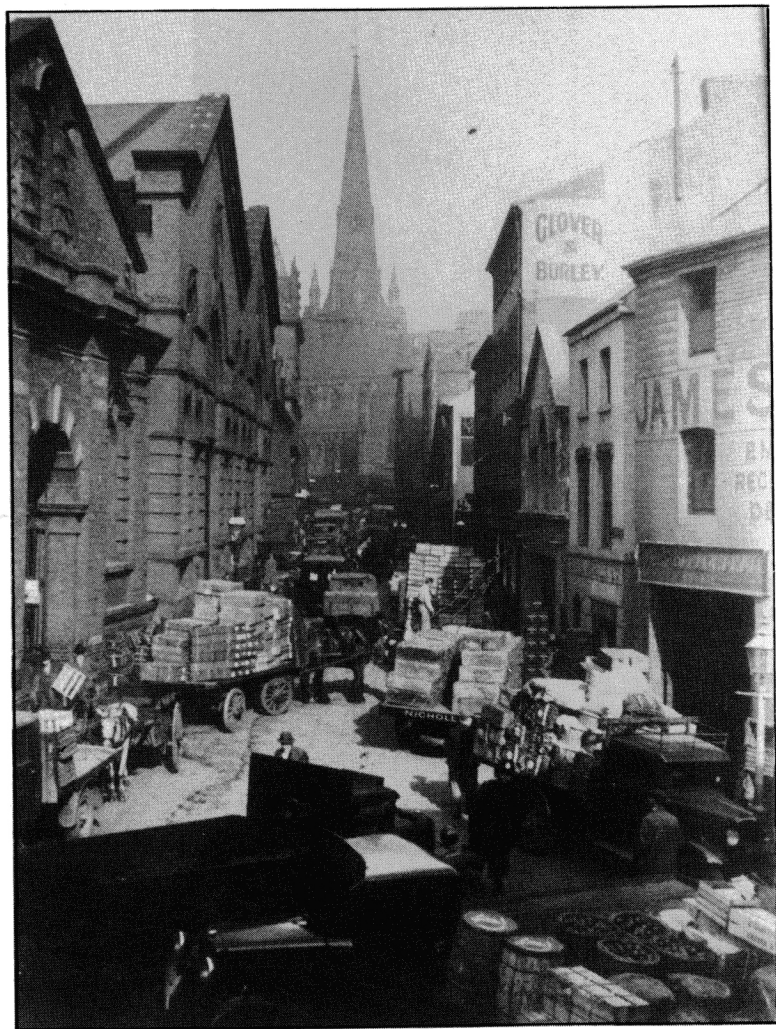




Map of the area 1940's.

SMITHFIELD MARKET, Moat Lane entrance. A very busy area. The original Rag Market was held here. It opened at 1.00 pm. on Tuesday and Saturday. The main gate was closed just prior to the opening and a large crowd would be waiting for it to open. The bell went at 1.00 pm and the porter shouted, "Wait for it", and everyone rushed in. It was a very popular and busy market area. At No. 20 was Glover & Burley, at 18 James Baragwanath & Co.Ltd., and at 22-23 Francis Nicholls Ltd., just a few of the Fruit Salesmen in the area.
